Camino Ruiz Rim to the Creek Hike w Les Braund Saturday, Jan. 20, 8 – 10 a.m.

Join naturalist Les Braund for a new hike location, leaving from Camino Ruiz Park. Most of the hike is in the shade of tall Chaparral vegetation and follows a switchback trail from the rim of the canyon down to the valley floor and stream side. See uncommon native plants such as the Summer holly shrub and others. Les says this is one of the most beautiful walks he's knows of. The park is located at the junction of Camino Ruiz and Calle Cristobal in Mira Mesa.

Crest Canyon Hike

Sun., Jan. 21: 2 p.m.

Join a Park Ranger for an exploration of Crest Canyon Open Space Park. Learn how to identify unique native plants, visit a habitat restoration site, and discover how you can get involved in projects in your parks. This easy, 2 mile hike has an elevation gain/loss of 200 feet on sandy and uneven surfaces. Please bring water, sun protection and sturdy shoes.

Lopez Homestead History Walk w Will Bowen

Sunday, Jan. 28, 3–5 p.m.

Hike into Lopez Canyon to learn about the Ramon Lopez Homestead — a small dairy farm from the 1880s. Visit the orchard, the old Lopez road, and see the remains of the house, barn, milking station, and cistern. Find out about the importance of the Lopez family in early San Diego history. Meet at the West End Parking Staging Area, 4300 Sorrento Valley Blvd.

February

Torrey Pines Loop Trail Hike

Sun., Feb. 4, 9:30 a.m.

Take a hike with a Ranger in beautiful Gonzalez Canyon. On this intermediate, 3 mile hike we will learn about plant communities, Kumeyaay ethnobotany, and local geology. This 3 mile hike has an elevation gain/loss of 300 feet on sometimes steep, rocky and uneven surfaces. Please bring water, sun protection, and sturdy shoes. Meet at Torrey Highlands Park, 4450 Lansdale Dr., San Diego, CA 92130. Look for the trailhead near the Dog Park.

Camino Ruiz Rim to the Creek Hike w Les Braund Saturday, Feb. 17, 8 – 10 a.m.

Join naturalist Les Braund for a new hike location, leaving from Camino Ruiz Park. Most of the hike is in the shade of tall Chaparral vegetation and follows a switchback trail from the rim of the canyon down to the valley floor and stream side. See uncommon native plants such as the Summer holly shrub and others. Les says this is one of the most beautiful walks he's knows of. Chicarita Creek, Sabre Springs Hike w Mike Kelly Sat., Feb. 24, 9 – 11 a.m.

Moderately paced on flat ground. Visit this little known gem of a creek, with a year round flow of good fresh water, amid a rich Oak habitat. This is also the site of a Native American People's village site, with bedrock grinding morteros. Learn a bit about San Diego's older history and about the habitats and important plants along the way. Meet on Evening Creek Dr. South, between Sabre Springs Pkwy and Sabre Hill Dr., San Diego.

Pedro Bovet Adobe History Hike w Will Bowen Sunday, Feb. 25, 3 – 5 p.m.

Examine some old photos and paintings of the Don Pedro Bovet Adobe in Carroll Canyon, then hike to the ruins. Bovet was a popular chef and windmaker of early San Diego. He married Ramon Lopez's sister. One of their daughters married into the Crosthwaite family of Rancho Poway and another married Diego Alvarado's son. Meet at the corner of Youngstown Way and Carroll Canyon Road.

South Clevenger Canyon Hike

Lusardi Canyon Wildflower Hike

Beginning Tracker/Naturalist Class

Sat., Feb. 24, 8:00 a.m.– 3:30 p.m. This class is structured to give the prospective tracker a base of tracking knowledge and strategies for developing a sharp eye for detail.

We concentrate on basic mammal track and sign identification to determine who made the track and briefly introduce the concept of track patterns and gaits as a means to interpret how an animal moves. Students are introduced to sketching and field journaling to reinforce learning objectives. At the end of this class you will: •Understand how awareness and naturalist skills are integrated with tracking. •Be able to identify the tracks, track patterns and other sign of several commonly found mammals in San Diego County and differentiate between tracks of animals in the same family. •Be introduced to journaling and field sketching as a way to better remember and recall details and experiences observed in nature. •Gain a basic knowledge of gait and track patterns and learn simple methods of analysis and interpretation. Intermediate Tracker/Naturalist Class

Sat., Mar. 24, 8:00 a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

The second course in the Tracker Naturalist series will expand your ability to identify a wider range of wildlife tracks over a variety of substrates, and comparing and contrasting tracks that are often confused by beginning trackers. Sign identification is enhanced by the introduction of skulls and jaws. We go deeper into the interpretation phase through additional track pattern and gait analyses and field experience (=dirt time). The basics of "aging" (=estimating age of) tracks and signs aging will be presented.

At the end of this class you will be able to identify a wider range of tracks, track patterns and other signs of several commonly found mammals and birds in San Diego County and to better differentiate between tracks of animals in the same family; be able to recognize from track patterns the relative speed at which an animal was moving; develop the ability to interpret a variety of tracks and track patterns and better understand how they relate to the movement, intent, and behavior of the animal; understand how to identify animals of our local area by their skulls, dental patterns, and jaw structures ; understand how weather and substrate affect the rate at which scat and other sign deteriorate; and know how to perform basic track aging.
